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
From the Minister

As we embark on our third year together I am mindful of all we have accomplished. And yet the future is wide open with possibilities. Our September theme is Expectation, and it invites us to consider what our hopes and expectations are for this year together, and what we need to let go of to embrace our wider vision. Our October theme is Belonging, I am mindful that when individuals come to this sacred community they seek a sense of belonging, a sense of coming home. Sometimes the expectations we have get in the way of our own belonging, and get in the way of us seeing how we belong to each other. This summer at General Assembly I sang in the ministers' choir. Whenever I do this I feel a strong sense of belonging, of being with "my people". We sang a song by Shoshana Jedwab with lyrics that go "Where you go I will go beloved, where you go I will go. Cause your people are my people, your people are mine." It was a haunting song in the midst of a national rhetoric of telling people they don't belong. We will be singing this song at our Ingathering Sunday service as we gather our waters together, celebrate all that we have, and all that the world is asking of us now.

With 58 of you saying yes to the journey of the anti-racist curriculum *Beloved Conversations* this September, this is something to celebrate. I am so excited to see what will come of this large group of people saying yes to having difficult conversations, learning, and working to dismantle white supremacy together.



I look forward to seeing what will unfold in this community this fall with so many things on the horizon. Geography of Grace - October 25th & 26th

Let us remember within us the ancient clay of the Earth, holding the memory of seasons, the passion of wind, the fluency of water, the warmth of fire, the quiver-touch of the sun and the shadowed sureness of the moon.





At the end of October, Rev. Shay MacKay and Rev. Diana McLean will be offering a two day journey through the geography of the soul, using themes from nature as metaphors that speak of the inner life. Shay and Diana warmly invite you to join them on this journey.

Based on the pioneering work of Dr. Parker Palmer and a process called the circle of trust, which is designed to create a safe and sacred space, the program uses poetry, story, music, and art to discover a valuable map of the terrain of our inner selves. There will be time for group discussion, silent journaling and meditation, and arts/crafts projects.

Learn how to listen deeply to one another (and ourselves!) and how to create spaces that are safe for honest sharing and self-discovery; witness, together, what happens when we begin to remember that within us dwells the ancient clay of the Earth.

The retreat will be held the evening of Friday, October 25th and all day on Saturday, October 26th. There is no homework and no prep-work for this journey - all you are required to do is show up with curiosity and compassion.

From the Board President

Yogi Berra once said,

"You got to be careful if you don't know where you're going, because you might not get there."

Our journey in life is full of changes, some painful, some joyful, some predictable, some unpredictable. As I become older and I would like to think, wiser, I began to understand that life is mostly about change and change can be unsettling to say the least. And it dawned on me that, yes, as Yogi said, I got to be careful. Was life just a long changing, meaningless journey? Like as Peggy Lee song in 1969:

"Is that all there is, 'is that all there is?'

If that's all there is my friends, then let's keep dancing."

I was missing something important. Dancing wasn't cutting it anymore. Then in the year 2000, I was traveling in South Korea and by chance (maybe) a Buddhist monk befriended me while traveling on a train and changed my life. That missing something was my spirituality. The UU 7 Principles began to make sense now. I discovered that Buddhist teaching shares a common understanding with these Principles, especially the 4th Principle: A free and responsible search for truth and meaning.

Now my journey has meaning and purpose. The wisdom of seeing my spiritual path unfolding before me, is my greatest pleasure. Each of us must travel our own spiritual path that gives us that pleasure - an Eastern saying may express this best, *"Not everyone will understand your journey, That's fine. It's not their journey to make sense of. It's yours".*

I have learned to embrace change. My search for "truth" may best be summed up in what Jack Kornfield, a Buddhist monk said in his book "The Wise Heart", "Love says 'I am everything.' Wisdom says 'I am nothing'. Between these two my life flows."

Children and Youth Ministries - Belonging

My hope is always that anyone who walks through our door can find a place to belong. I especially wish this for our children, youth and families. In today's world, with social media and on-line platforms, the ways in which our children and youth can feel like they don't belong are plentiful, and for parents, and caregivers it can feel just as hard to find connection and belonging whilst juggling full schedules, work and parenting.

This year we are making sure every age feels like they belong at FPB. New this year will be a *Chalice Children Program* for our 4 and 5 year old's. *Chalice Children* helps foster an understanding of Unitarian Universalism and promotes relationship building, kindness and fun! Our 1-5th grades will be taking a journey through time and space as we explore our 7 Principles, really bringing the principles alive with immersive activities, field trips and special guests. For our 6th-8th grades we are running *Coming of Age*, a program that helps youth make the transition from childhood to youth. Each participant is paired with a mentor and the program is rich, deep and extremely fun! On top of that we have our *High School Youth*



Program on Sunday evenings; a small group ministry for youth, where they get to be their whole authentic selves whilst having fun and working for justice.

I encourage you all to think about how you might belong to the CYM program. There are many ways to volunteer and mentor these amazing children and youth as you can see from these pictures of our Extraordinary Summer Program that we launched this year.

Nursery: Led by our incredible childcare provider Claudia, children 0-3 years spend the morning playing in community, being nurtured and loved as they learn to a find home at FPB

Chalice Children: New this year children 4-6 years will be participating in the Chalice Children Curriculum. Chalice Children delves deep into our Unitarian Universalist faith. It strives not just to teach about our faith, but also to provide experiences around the strength of community, the wonder and awe that transcend everyday understanding, and life issues we all share.

Time Travelers: For our 7-11 year olds were are going to be participating in a curriculum that takes us into the past, present and future as we explore the 7 Principles of Unitarian Universalism. This curriculum is a fun and interactive year bringing our faith to life. Field Trips, Speakers, Arts, Adventure and Fun are all guaranteed.

Coming of Age: For our middle school youth, we are running Coming of Age. Youth are paired with an adult mentor and tasked to investigate their personal spirituality with the support of their mentors. Youth participants in the program are encouraged to develop a greater sense of what they believe. They do this through discussion, listening to guest speakers, and participating in retreats and workshops. Workshops may be designed to prompt the youth, challenge their modes of thinking, or aid them in furthering their ideas. Overnights, team building trips, and writing a credo are all part of this life changing program.

High School Youth Group: Our High School Youth group provides a safe and sacred space for our youth to grow into their faith. The youth own the program and create what the year looks like together. Team building, discussion, laughter, snacks, ritual, service, and active listening to each other all form part of the youth group year.

Expectation: Without knowing exactly how we would do it, we expected to solve a big problem, and we did it, together! At one point in our previous fiscal year, we thought we could be as much as \$30,000 in the red, yipes! But through a series of cost-cutting moves and generous gifts from many of you, we closed out our books with over \$3,000 in the black. The Board voted to pay the remaining balance of our UUA Annual Program Fund dues for FY19.

Belonging: After many years of devotion, wise counsel, and service as Treasurer and Member of the Finance Committee, Dave Winther has resigned. With great gratitude for all he has done for the financial health of FPB, we say a loving farewell. We will be seeking a Board appointment for the Finance Committee. If you are a new member of FPB, if you are curious and committed to learning, or if you have past experience in financial matters, you are welcome!

Attention: Some of the things the Finance Committee will focus their attention on when we begin meeting again in September will be: establishing a 3 to 5-year budget, financial policies, financial controls, succession planning, and using the balance sheet.



From the Endowment Board

The Endowment Board wishes to acknowledge a generous bequest to the First Parish Brewster Endowment Fund from the estate of Mary Jane (MJ) McDonald.

MJ was dedicated at First Parish Brewster when she was about two years old! Although raised as a Congregationalist, she married a Unitarian Universalist. When they moved back to the Cape, she chose to attend FPB and became a member in the spring of 1988. "It was the place for me."

MJ has been a strong supporter of the Endowment Fund over the years. In 2015 we received another gift from the Mary Jane McDonald Family Fund. She is quoted in our Endowment Brochure as follows: "I want to see our church survive and thrive. And the Endowment Fund is one of the best ways to make that happen." We are grateful for her generosity. A memorial service was held for MJ at First Parish in February.

It is gifts such as MJ's bequest that have enabled the Endowment Fund to grow over the years. The Endowment



Fund now totals \$593,657.00 and we are steadily repaying our Endowment Loan. This year the Board of Trustees, the Endowment Board and the congregation voted to use up to \$20,000 of the available FY 20 distribution to pay down the balance of the loan, which is currently \$191,073.00

Since the establishment of the Endowment Board in 2002, the Fund has made contributions totaling \$203,136.00 in support of First Parish.
