
White Fragility Book Discussion

A Closer Look at FUNdraising

As I look upon the fundraising team, for which I provided the initial impetus, I am happy to note that it has grown quickly from me to we. I have had great support from the members of the team, and although I am still the point person for the team, there is an understanding that we are doing this together (we being the team as well as those who come to gain support for their ideas).

Developing a fundraising team came to me as an idea six months ago when I was still on the Board. It was then that I had the glaring realization that this was an important aspect of the church that sorely needed to be cultivated. So I decided to take it on.

I started by talking to a group of interested people, many of whom committed to work with me as part of a fundraising effort. For me, foundational to any fundraising event at FPB



was the idea of building community within our congregation as well as broadening our connections to our town neighbors. And we have been doing just that! Another cornerstone is anchored in providing fun, quality entertainment, culture, and/or education to both FPB members and the larger Brewster community and adjacent towns. Ideas are brainstormed using this premise, and a hoped-for funding stream has begun to emerge resulting in a calendar of replicable events.

Besides these stated goals coming to fruition, others have taken shape. One is the building of a more solid infrastructure for fundraising events. Karena and COVE volunteers, have put together a clear listing for all PR that includes local newspapers and radio stations, complete with timelines and contact information. The office has also obtained a subscription for software that assists in cataloging and forming bid sheets for silent auctions. This has greatly reduced the workload and streamlined the auction process.

Another goal is the developing of a stronger presence in the community. As we become a focal point for quality events, the word is getting out. The publicity around the Potato Fest certainly did that as well as the group of solicitors for the auction who shared with local businesses and donors the values and work of the FPB community. Additionally grants were written and submitted to the local cultural councils, and I have been told by a grant reader that they were of high quality that will likely end in a positive result. Awards are currently pending.

Finally, as was alluded to, after six months, a framework of a yearly schedule of events has begun to form. Included are:

- A summer congregational gathering (Lobster Roll Cruise)
- Two fall events (The Potato Fest and a concert this year "Deeper Than The Skin")
- Two winter events (the Holiday Festival and a classical concert scheduled for February)
- Two spring events (a garden/art tour which is in the planning stages and the Time and Talent Auction specific to FPB members and friends).

The team will be evaluating this schedule as we decide what should be repeated, improved upon, and or replaced. And speaking of the team, if this work appeals to you just give me a shout. New members are wanted and welcome. Come dream with us, come work with us, come have fun!

Please consider how you might serve the congregation by sharing your passion and expertise. Thank you for your time and willingness to be a part of the Pathways program.


In Harmony

From the Treasurer

Here's the highlights of FPB's financial status at the end of the first quarter of the church year, which ended on September 30th. Pledge commitments are about \$6,000 more than in the annual budget as passed by the congregation at our annual meeting in June. The offertory is about \$1,800 behind budget. The Thrift Store is just ahead of budget. Expenses are just under budget. Overall, lookin' good!

We've had 3 successful FPB fundraisers, and have already made \$7,000 of the \$8,000 we've budgeted for this year, and the winter holiday fundraiser is on the way! Much of the success can be attributed to collaboration! Kudos to the people who have stepped up and said, 'I have an idea!' Kudos to the new Fundraising Committee which has helped turn inspired ideas into financial successes. This new way of doing things shows us there is an important place for all of the butterflies and the bees among us. We love a good tradition, but let's promise that if it starts to feel like drudgery, we can let go, and trust that a new good idea will come. Let's joyfully raise money by providing meaningful and fun ways for us to connect with one another, and with the wider community.


