

About the front cover's contribution author, James Weldon Johnson (1871-1938).

James Weldon Johnson was an early civil rights activist, poet, novelist and songwriter of such song as "Lift Every Voice and Sing". Johnson was a lawyer, foreign nation consul for the United States in Venezuela and Nicaragua, served as chief executive of the NAACP and one of the leading figures of the Harlem Renaissance. In 1904, Johnson served as treasurer of the Colored Republican Club. He believed that it was important for blacks to both produce great art and literature as well as demonstrate their intellectual equality in America.


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



Covenant Groups comprise 8-10 people who meet monthly to share insights and observations on a variety of themes provided by the UUA "Soul Matters" curriculum.

Through the practice of "deep listening," we listen to one another without interruption, critique, response, offering advice or crosstalk, we grow to form lasting connections while focusing on each month's spiritual theme. Deep listening is transformative, creating a safe environment of profound trust, caring, and belonging.

2020-2021 themes include Deep Listening, Healing, Stillness, Imagination, Beloved Community, Commitment, Becoming, Story, and Play.

Each group has two trained facilitators who themselves meet monthly to discuss how to conduct, deepen, and expand their groups. Several groups continued meeting on Zoom over the summer, and we are learning how to adapt to virtual meetings. Facilitators are working toward the goal of making Covenant Groups an even more vital part of worship in the COVID-19 era. But as well-intentioned as those who lean on such phrases may be, experts are cautioning against going overboard with the "good vibes only" trend. Too much-forced positivity is not just unhelpful, they say — it's toxic. While cultivating a positive mindset is a powerful coping mechanism, toxic positivity stems from the idea that the best or only way to cope with a bad situation is to put a positive spin on it and not dwell on the negative. It results from our tendency to undervalue negative emotional experiences and overvalue positive ones."

Reading this article helped me to realize that it's so important to talk about our negative reactions. So as we move forward through this pandemic, I hope we all understand that at times it's okay not to feel okay.




#### A Year of Living Kindly Book Club

# An Eighth Principle for UU's

"We, the member congregations of the UUA, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse, multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

This is the proposed UU 8th Principle. At General Assembly, this principle was a constant focus, especially given all that is happening in our country around racism and white privilege. Paula Cole Jones, one of the original authors of the principle, suggested it might even be better as a preface to our Principles, rather than an addendum.

But wait, isn't this already covered in the other seven principles? If we took the time to sit with each of them, would we see *actions that accountably dismantle oppression*?

People used to ask why we needed to become a Welcoming Congregation -- didn't we already welcome everyone? Maybe, but LGBT folks had been specifically prohibited from attending Church, specifically un-welcomed. So, the action was needed to accountably dismantle the oppression of homophobia.

We invite all FPB folks to join us in deep reflection about how our existing seven principles reflect actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions -- or don't.

#### From the Endowment Board



For the past 17 years, the Endowment Fund has provided annual financial support for FPB special programing and the enhancement of the buildings and grounds of our campus. As of June 30, 2020, this totaled \$227,488.

At our annual meeting this June, the congregation voted by a two -thirds majority to authorize the disbursement of up to \$110,000, if needed, from the Endowment Fund for "the operating expenses of First Parish Brewster in FY2021." (Note: This is \$77,550 over the 5% distribution already permitted under the Bylaws.) This will offer the financial support needed to provide for our dedicated staff and maintain our programs during this time of the COVID-19 pandemic.

We are grateful to all those who have contributed so generously to the Endowment Fund over the years. It is these gifts which allow us to support our beloved church today. Thank you for your past and continued generosity.

# One Earth One People/Racial Justice

Our Committee is working to add Barnstable, Dennis, Wellfleet, and Truro to the Cape towns that passed articles supporting the state resolution to change the MA flag and seal. Most town meetings have been postponed until fall. After 34 years, this current resolution just passed unanimously in the State Senate and is now awaiting the House of Representatives vote. We are writing letters to involved Senators and Representatives.

We write to our legislators in support of the Black Lives Matter movement and show our support of this effort through our presence at demonstrations/marches.

We support the Wampanoag against the Department of the Interior, which revoked the 2015 decision to place 300 acres of land in trust for the Wampanoags, with a declaration of the lands as their sovereign reservation. The US House of Representatives just passed legislation to prevent the Interior agency from rescinding the Wampanoag land trust and their sovereign rights. Letters from committee members and others have been sent to challenge or support those involved.

Thus, we open hearts, grow souls, and turn love into justice. We seek to heal the human family. We welcome and appreciate the interest of anyone who would share in our efforts.

# In Harmony - Music Ministries

Pandemic music-making is an enormous challenge, especially for vocal/choral folks and those who play

wind instruments, as aerosols are the primary form of transmission of COVID-19. String and keyboard players have it a little easier, though performances in public are substantially curtailed.

I have felt deep grief for choirs and instrumentalists with whom I regularly work with at First Parish Brewster and elsewhere. Spring Music Sunday with Choir and Ensemble of First Parish Brewster was to be a presentation of the 8 Principles through a Broadway extravaganza - a morning of moving and rollicking show tunes, which speak to renewal, deep listening, and healing.

I was to have conducted a dream concert this past spring – "Fanny and Felix: Great Works of the Mendelssohns," with two choruses and full orchestra.

With the development of the COVID-19 crisis, our Committee has been challenged in much of the same way that we have seen in every level of human interrelationships. Without clear information and walking on untrodden ground, we met through monthly Zoom meetings. We agreed to be supportive in erring on the side of safety in guiding the policies of closing the property and putting the health of the congregation as a top priority. It was helpful having Marie Hartley, a member of the COVID-19 Task Force, present to give guidance on the updated medical information as it became available.

We are, in hindsight, relieved that caution was justified, as difficult as it has been to be forced to adapt to distanced relations and interactions. The creativity that Reverend Jessica and the Board have demonstrated is admirable given the unique challenge of these times and the intimate nature of shared worship in a spiritual community.

This challenge was revealed in the unfortunate way in which the decision not to renew the contract of the OMG Musical Group was executed. Impactful decisions involving valued community members are never easy, and it would have been much preferable to have been handled in a more transparent, direct, and sensitive manner rather than through email. We are hopeful that healing can be done in this area and that lessons can be learned that the value and dignity of each person who brings their gifts to FPB receive the appreciation and respect that they deserve.
