Faith Family Kitchen, which is under the auspices of the Cape Cod Council of Churches, provides meals year-round for people who are food insecure. The meals are served at the Faith Assembly of God church in Hyannis. They are planned and prepared by Jeni, an enthusiastic and skilled cook who purchases food from the Boston Food Bank and local farmers. The meals are both nutritious and delicious. This is not just a meal to sustain, it's food prepared and served with love. Every 4th Friday of the month volunteers from FPB help to prepare and serve the meal. There's great camaraderie and we leave with the feeling of having made a difference in the lives of others. Some of the people we are serving are homeless, others are struggling to make ends meet.

One man shared that he had once had a job and a house, but he lost both due to drinking. He was proud to tell me that he was now sober and looking for work. Due to the pandemic, the last time we volunteered was in March. Jeni presently has a single team of helpers helping her with all the meals. We miss this work, and look forward to being able to continue as we were.

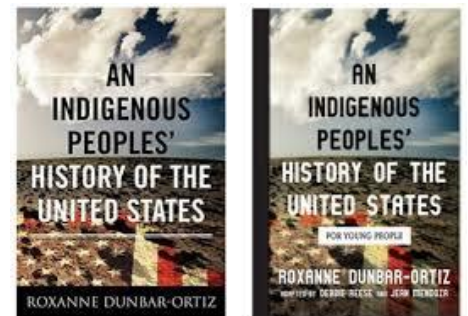

As we move forward, I hope that we all have the resilience and patience to deal with the challenges and difficulties that we are facing, as we live with the “new normal”.

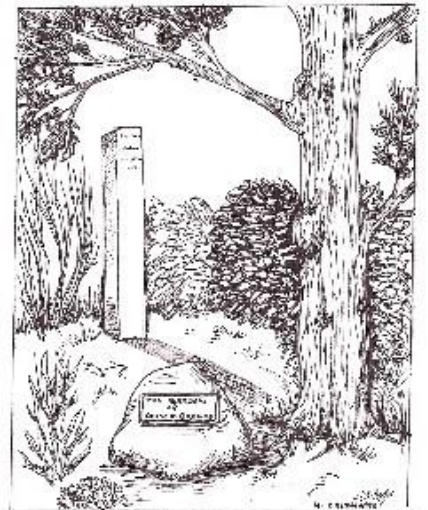

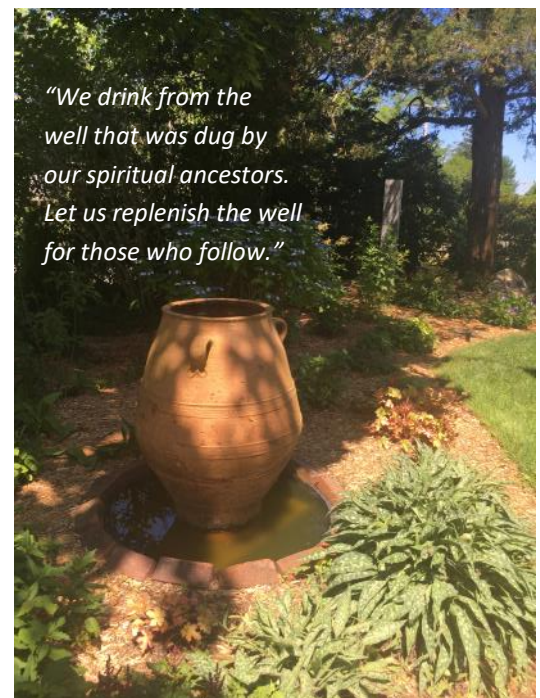
Financial Report:

All First Parish Brewster’s Endowment Funds are managed by Cape Cod Five Trust and Asset Management in consultation with the Endowment Board. All funds are invested in socially responsible mutual funds. The most recent financial report dated May 31, 2020 showed an Endowment Fund balance of \$959,782.47. The Building Loan Repayment Fund balance was \$48,824.91 and the remaining balance due on the Building Loan was \$123,175.09. In FY 2020 the Endowment Board distributed \$24,352.

At the annual meeting, the congregation voted to use up to \$110,000 of Endowment funds for operating expenses in FY 2021. We are a resilient congregation and the well will be replenished. The Endowment Board is aware of many who have named the Endowment Fund in their estate planning.

New Endowment Board for July 1, 2020 - June 30, 2021:

Endowment Board members for FY 2021 are Linda Bailey-Davies (2022), Bob Flanagan (2021), Howard Hayes (2021), John Kielb (2023) and Bruce MacGregor (2023). Board officers (Chair, Financial Secretary and Recording Secretary) will be elected at the first Endowment Board meeting of the new fiscal year. Ex-officio members are the Minister, the President and Treasurer of the Board of Trustees and the Administration and Finance Director.



Environmental Activism at FPBUU and Beyond

Since 2017, FPBUU has been a member of the Faith Communities Environmental Network (FCEN) an affiliate of the Cape Cod Climate Change Collaborative (5 C's); our mission: “. . . to educate, advocate, and share best practices to protect the Earth and her inhabitants.” Despite differences in our theology and worship practices, we discovered shared connections and allies – from Pope Francis to Senator Edward Markey to Dr. Phillip Duffy, Director of the Woods Hole Research Center.

Recently, FCEN members had an opportunity to think more broadly about our mission as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic and the ways in which staying at home has shown what happens when, e.g., we drive less and walk or bike more. The media is replete with examples of clearing skies and reduced emissions revealing what these changes might mean for us and for future generations.

The work of FCEN has continued virtually, and we seek ways to engage the wider Cape Cod community, especially our youth – the major stakeholders in the continuing viability of our fragile spit of land.
