

through our Annex Parking Lot. A group of parishioners, including three members of the Board of Trustees, will meet with Mr. Holden to discuss our concerns (zoning restrictions, insurance liability for potential damage to the solar field and drainage system, use of the driveway easement) and report back to the Board at the March meeting.

Members of the staff and Board met with members of the UU Meetinghouse of Chatham to explore areas of collaboration. We discussed our social justice initiatives, youth program, Meetinghouse Speaker Series, and ways to find administrative support.

The *Financial Futures Tiger Team* has been exploring the possibility of purchasing a parsonage for our minister. We anticipate the need to provide housing due to the high cost of real estate and the low inventory of affordable rentals on Cape Cod. We have scheduled an information session on Sunday, March 26, at 11:30 in the Sanctuary to discuss this topic with the congregation.

Administration and Finance Ministries

There is a quiet beauty in giving oneself time to simply be. This is what I did last July through October on my sabbatical. Taking that time away changed me in ways still unfolding, and there is a vulnerability in all of this. Stepping back into First Parish Brewster UU has been like getting on an airport moving walkway. It can feel strange if you haven't been on one in a while. There are unspoken but fundamental rules that one must follow because we are all navigating this moving thing together. What I do affects you, and what you do affects me. One must recognize that some people will continue to walk, while others will need to simply stand and let the walkway carry them along for a bit. There is no one right way for all, and staying aware of one's own needs as well as the needs of others is important.

Taking extended time away from work is often reserved for sickness, tragedy, or other reasons that are out of our control, but to do it intentionally is an act of resistance. We live in a society that values overworking as if it's a valid investment in the future. My experience of returning to work after my sabbatical is one of wonder and curiosity. Both my broader and up-close perspectives of the work of FPBUU have shifted. It's a creative process of putting all the many pieces back together and turning them into a meaningful collage.

Endowment Board

The Endowment Board has had a busy year with almost double the amount of money to distribute after we paid off our loan! The congregation was very generous in working on getting this paid off, and we are all reaping the benefits.



Some of the projects funded by the Endowment Board include the *Soul of Aging* workshop, which many participants talked about how helpful this was. We funded a CYM retreat. We also have contributed money for advertising for the *Meeting House Series*, which has drawn big crowds from within First Parish and the wider community. In addition to helping with the maintenance of all our buildings, we helped with the playground repair for our children. So, the Endowment Fund has been helping us, from the wee ones to our elders, and even making our buildings look good!

We have approved \$49,656 already and still have \$22,871 available for distribution prior to June 30, 2023. So next fiscal year, we will have \$59,067 for distribution, which is 5% of the Fund's value as of December 30, 2022. This amount will increase as the Endowment Fund continues to grow.

What's Going On With The Meeting House Windows?

Building Maintenance Committee is happy to announce that ALL the windows in the Meeting House now actually close and are weather-tight! Previously, even when the latches were closed, there were gaps up to half an inch wide between the upper and lower sashes, so we were heating and cooling the great outdoors.

In addition, the old, brittle sash cords have been replaced with shiny new sash chains wherever possible. Every window has at least one new sash chain, preventing the windows from suddenly descending, if the sash cords snap.

Most windows have two new sash chains -- however, due to the vagaries of 19th-century construction, it was prohibitively expensive to dig out the sash weights in a few of the windows. This restoration work was done beautifully by Nancy Barrington of Window Restoration of Cape Cod and her crew.

Every window was removed, refurbished, and replaced. During her careful

work, Nancy discovered a couple of rotten spots in window sills, which the Building Maintenance Committee will be drying out and repairing this month. The cost of the window restoration was \$14,000 (despite Nancy having undercounted our windows, of which there are 18.) In addition, Nancy fixed an air leak under one of the south doors of the Meeting House at no additional cost.

We are grateful to Nancy and her crew for their outstanding work and to the Endowment Fund for approving this unexpected costs as part of the Building Maintenance '22-'23 expenses.





April 22, 2023, marks the 53rd observance of Earth Day. What better time to honor our congregation's commitment in 2014 as an accredited *Green Sanctuary* certified by the UUA? As part of the accreditation process, we committed to a lighter planetary footprint by adopting significant changes in our buildings and congregational life:


- installation of windows in our buildings that allow maximizing heating and cooling functions,
- —installation of a solar array on our upper parking lot that allows us to reduce our monthly utility bills,
- —installation of an Energy Saver dishwasher to clean dishes & silverware efficiently

In addition, we took steps to reduce the use of disposables, especially at our weekly post-service coffee hour, including:

- —use of ceramic cups & plates, and glasses to replace paper and styrofoam,
- —use of metal utensils to replace plastic forks, knives & spoons,
- —use of cloth napkins to replace paper napkins

Let's celebrate Earth Day 2023 by recommitting to a lighter footprint – in our homes and our congregational home. Please take the time to consider ways that you can walk more lightly on the planet.
