


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Administration and Finance Ministries

I finished my summer with a meditation retreat on Star Island. What a gift! I discovered this Sangha, a community devoted to a spiritual practice of meditating together, last year during my sabbatical. It has become a meaningful part of my self care. The welcome I received by this group of meditators was what kept

me coming back throughout the year as members from around the world met via Zoom. At the in-person retreat last year and again this year, I was inspired by the deep sharing and vulnerability of all present, and it reminded me of how everyone is holding pain, sorrow, joy and all the complexities of being human. It's right there below the surface, if we take the time to be with one another. I am convinced that 90% of building relationships is simply showing up and the other 10% is listening. Not waiting for my turn to speak, but really listening. The gift of presence is powerful. There are members of this Sangha that have taken a vow to end all suffering, which at first sounded idealistic and unachievable. But if I am honest, this is exactly what I believe we need more of. Not scaling back our goals to what we think is doable because the fact is, we are not alone, and many hands make light work. When I hear the word heritage, I typically think about the past, but what if we flipped it and explored what we want the ones coming after us to inherit? What if we worked towards something with a commitment to ending all suffering without really knowing how it will come to be. I don't mean to say this is the easy path, but more and more I see it is



the only path to live a life full of meaning. Not as concerned with my individual needs and wants, but what was I incarnated here at this time to do? Sometimes when I feel overwhelmed by the suffering of the world, I turn my struggle over to God, and practice the simple yet powerful act of being willing to be willing. I don't have to know where we are going to be generous in spirit and take the next right action. Will you join me?

Covenant Groups – A Program of Small Group Ministry

Covenant Groups of 6-10 people meet on one designated weekday each month, October through May, for 1.5 to 2 hours. Group members share insights and personal experiences on monthly themes. We practice "deep listening" to one another without critique, response, or crosstalk. Through this practice, we grow to form lasting connections while also participating in a congregation-wide dialogue centering on each month's spiritual theme. This year's overarching frame is *The Gifts of Our Faith*, which focuses on the following themes and explores their potential to shape us and the world.

September: Welcome February: Justice & Equity

October: Heritage March: Transformation

November: Generosity April: Interdependence

December: Mystery May: Pluralism

January: Liberating Love June: Renewal



We do not meet until October, and in June, we typically meet to share a meal in a social context, celebrating our year of spiritual connection. Covenant Groups are a great way for new and old congregation members to get to know each other at a deeper level. We currently have seven groups that include all-Zoom, hybrid (combined in-person and Zoom), and all-in-person, with a choice of morning, afternoon, and evening times. If you have remained in one group for several years, you might consider joining a different group to get a fresh perspective.

On Repentance and Repair: Making Amends in an Unapologetic World is the 2023/2024 UU Common Read. Rabbi Danya Ruttenberg centers a crucial new lens on repentance, atonement, forgiveness, and repair from harm - from personal transgressions to our culture's most painful and unresolved issues - critiquing an American culture that tends to prioritize redemption narratives and letting go of grudges.

Although based on traditional Jewish concepts, this read is accessible to folks of any or no religious background. *On Repentance and Repair* is for all who are committed to creating a society and culture more whole than the one in which we live and for anyone who has been hurt or is struggling to take responsibility for their mistakes.

It has been a time of transition at First Parish Brewster UU since the Spring Quarterly Angle appeared on March 6, 2023. Rev. Jessica's daughter Elanor arrived in early March to great fanfare, and Rev. Kenn Hurto stepped in on April 1 as Leave Minister during her parental leave. Then, in early April, Rev. Jessica announced that, after six years as our minister, she would be leaving FPB for a 1,000+ member UU congregation in the suburbs of Minneapolis, the next step in her journey. Completing the UUA's whirlwind search process, in late May, FPB matched with Rev. Kaaren Anderson as our Interim Minister to lead us through the transition to our next settled minister. We are fortunate to have a strong congregation committed to working through this transition.

We have strengthened our finances considerably over the past year and anticipate further strengthening over the next several years in terms of pledge growth and other funding sources. In addition, the energy of our members has not faltered through the recent years of pandemic or these more recent turbulent times. As just one piece of evidence of that, over 50 congregants are assisting with our new SNO@UU program being held, as I write this during the last two weeks of August.

If you are not yet familiar with that program, its goal, as described by Twinks Hastings, Director of the program and our Lifespan Religious Education Director, is to: "fill a community need for children's programming during the two weeks after summer camps have ended and school has begun. With diverse activities geared around environmental and social justice themes, we hope our 'Adventurers'

<u>Meetinghouse Concert Series</u> – Sunday, November 19th, 2 pm The Meetinghouse Concert Series was conceived after our beautiful Meetinghouse's reconstruction in 2010. The series hosted many wonderful performers and was a popular venue for First Parish Brewster UU members and the community. We are excited to bring the concert series back but with a few new twists. Is it possible to combine music and social justice? Music and education? Music and culture? Of course! We are committed to merging all these elements into the program!



On November 19th, our first performance will be the return of a favorite, Jacqueline Schwab. From the soundtracks of Ken Burns' documentaries to the White House to the PBS American Roots special with The American Pops Orchestra, pianist Jacqueline Schwab is known for evoking the American musical past, but in a fresh, personal way. Jacqueline will share her program, *I Lift My Lamp*, a celebration of immigrant music from Western and Eastern Europe, Latin and South America, and will also include African-American spirituals, Tin Pan Alley tunes, and Ragtime.

Fundraising Committee (more fundraising programs)

<u>Purchasing Food Cards</u> Is there any such thing as free money? There is!! Just by buying food cards, we generate money for First Parish! If you purchase your groceries from Stop and Shop or Shaw's, FPB offers food cards in \$100, \$50, & \$25 denominations that, when purchased, we get 5 percent of the cost!



For example, by purchasing \$400 in food cards monthly, FPBUU receives \$20. If you continue to purchase monthly throughout the year, FPB will earn \$240.

Last year we raised \$964! Let's see if we can increase that \$\$\$ this year! The more people can participate and purchase the food cards, the more money we can raise. Food cards can be purchased with CASH or CHECK during Sunday coffee hour and at the Winslow office, Mon-Thurs, 9-Noon.

<u>Craft Group Crafties Workshops</u> After last year's Holiday Fair, an idea was hatched by Elenita Muniz and Tavia Ossola – to gather and make crafted items to support FPBUU and sell at our FUNdraising events. Throughout the spring, a group of "Crafties" gathered to develop some creative ideas and craft items to sell

at our Spring Festival. This idea was successful, and the Holiday Fair Gift Shop raised \$750! Our craft mornings were so productive and fun that we decided to continue in the fall.

This past summer, we made driftwood (collected on Cape Cod beaches), sailboat ornaments, paper collage bookmarks, and decoupaged boxes with vintage stamps to include in the upcoming Holiday Fair Gift Shop.

This fall, we will resume our Wednesday morning crafting sessions. Once a month, we will do an evening craft session for those who cannot make it a daytime event. These dates will be announced in the fall as we get closer.

The role of the FPBUU Policy Committee is to respond to requests by the Board of Trustees (BOT) to develop language, in the form of policies, to guide and inform the actions and decisions of both individuals and groups in ways consistent with FPBUU's mission and values. Once approved by the BOT, these policies are posted on the FPBUU website. The Committee meets monthly from September through May/June.

During 2022-23, the Committee produced two new policies (Use and Protection of Personal Data and Conflict of Interest (Boards)). In addition, the Committee developed significant revisions to five existing policies (Communication, Financial Controls, Donation Acceptance, Fundraising, and Board Meetings).

SNO@UU: This summer program aligns with our mission of serving families, with social justice themes woven throughout and providing an additional revenue source. Thanks to Twinks, Laura Gill, Christine McDowell, Susan Smith and 50 hard-working volunteers for the launch of this initiative.

Energy Group and Battery Storage: We've contracted with ATP Network LLC of Ashby, MA. ATP links revenue-generating opportunities concerning battery storage facilities with churches and others. Battery Energy Storage Systems evens usage in our electric grid during peak times and power outages. FPB could receive a substantial yearly income with no upfront costs if successful.

Meetinghouse Motors: The truck donation resulted in \$1,580. We brainstorm ways to amplify and publicize this program, seeking unwanted cars, trucks, motorcycles, and motorboats on Cape Cod.

Rental Income: Volunteers have been cleaning, decluttering, and staging areas around the campus to get them more "camera ready" as attractive rental spaces. We are concentrating on the Barn, currently the campus for SNO@UU, but in the future, more attractive, usable areas for rental as well. We are revisiting our rental pricing structure.

Grants: Grants recently awarded, and being applied for again in this church year, are those from the Cultural Councils of Brewster, Dennis & Orleans, & Cape Cod 5 for *Meetinghouse Speaker Series* and the UUA for *UUtheVote*. Our grants subgroup continues to monitor possible suitable grants. FPB is working on becoming a 501c3, which has been a barrier in the application process.

- "Wabi Sabi" Margaret Rice Moir and other members will share their creativity and perhaps surprise you with yours!


Among other planned programs, we'll have an art project, some poetry, affordable housing, perhaps some dogs, and a music program to entertain us at our December Holiday Gathering!

Building Maintenance Committee Preserving Heritage

Preserving heritage is the charge of the Building Maintenance Committee. The second largest expense in the FPBUU annual budget is for building maintenance. Why? Mostly because of our five buildings (Meeting House, Parish Hall, Dawes Hall, Barn, and Winslow House), three are historic antiques. Twelve years ago, we spent \$1.6 million preserving our Meeting House. But here's the thing about old buildings: they're never finished!



Preserving a historic building is a special challenge. A current BMC work-in-progress is repairing two areas of rot in the Meeting House balcony window sills. Removing and replacing the sills would entail an enormous expense, as these spruce sills are 3" thick and run the full width of each double window. While it's not customary for our committee to do the work ourselves, in this case, Judy Fenner is calling on her 35-year history of boat restoration for the task. Judy is going to install a "Dutchman" in the two sills with rot. This entails digging out the rotten wood and creating a wooden replacement that exactly fits the hole left behind. She will use epoxy to fasten in the new wood, then it will be primed and painted to match.

The first step has been to dry out the wood, which involved Kris Yerby and Roger Smith sitting in the open windows with hairdryers. Judy removed most of the rot and is currently waiting for a good clear full day, with no rain before or after, to create and install the Dutchmen.

Heritage matters. As stewards of our historic campus, we want the work to be well-done, to endure, and to reduce the long-term expense of maintenance. New members are always welcome on our committee!

From the Endowment Board



Building a Bigger Table Update on Families

The Gonzalez Family: After three years in Union City, NJ, they moved to Jersey City to a furnished former parsonage for \$1,000 a month for the first year. They liked having many neighbors previously and are finding their way in the new location, including new buses to get to work and the church where they used to go. But they have been to the beach with Rev. Jill and have appointments for uniforms and medical needs. They have their work permits, Social Security cards, and a July 2024 proposed court date for their asylum status.

Worcester Family: In May, Sue and Pat Gubbins and two of their kids visited Cecilia and Charles, whose car is not good enough to travel to the Cape. Cecilia and Charles are baking meat pies to sell along with other work.

Ukrainian Family: They moved out of the McDonald home in Brewster in June. Ruslan now has his own one-bedroom apt. in Dennis, and Lana is there too with Vlady. Her mother is in Natick in public housing with another Ukrainian family nearby.

Ntumba Family: They will be speaking at Brewster Ladies Library in October. Tony works in Sagamore. They have a car now, making it easier than taking buses. Their daughter, Joelle, goes to school in Hyannis.

Caring Committee

The Caring Committee members spent 2022-2023 responding to approximately 30 members monthly. The members welcomed and appreciated the visits, chats, phone calls, and even outings.

Over the years, committee members focused more on in-kind services, like delivering soup and a meal to a member in need, rides to appointments, and visits. The Covid crisis brought on isolation in a way we had not experienced before.



Because of the generosity of our Committee members, we were able to engage with more members, provide more services and get to know one another better and care about each member getting to know each other in a whole new way. We were involved with members and their families as they dealt with joyful times, and they were also involved with our members when they lost a loved one.

From September to June, our hope for this year is to continue involvement with congregants who want support in the form of a visitor or friend. We also want to invite all interested in serving to attend our first meeting on Tuesday, September 5, at 11 AM in the Winslow House. We welcome your interest and involvement. Our meeting is on Monday, October 2, at 11 AM in the Parish Room, where we will present information on working with folks with memory loss issues. Our facilitator for that meeting will be Tia Cross.



From the Treasurer

At FPBUU the Summer is always a time of transition, as we close out one Fiscal Year and start a new one. This past Summer brought us even greater transitions as we move into interim Ministry with Kaaren. We look forward to welcoming her and beginning the next year together.

As a reflection of the past several years I've created the graph below to provide a high-level view of our financial approach since the Pandemic. In this graph the blue line represents our Budget Net Income, meaning our Budgeted Income minus Expenses. The green line represents the Year End actuals, Income minus Expenses. Prior to the Pandemic, the goal was a zero-based budget, and in 2019 our actuals were right on target. Our 2020 fiscal year, ending June 2020, was understandably bad, we went from a Net zero budget to a significant loss. Each year since then we have set a deficit budget, meaning we plan to spend more than we received in income. We did this to pay staff fairly and because inflation has increased expenses in the last few years. We have been able to cover these deficits through the infusion of federal pandemic relief funds. The good news is that since 2020 our Year End Actuals have been better than budgeted and with our 2023-2024 budget, we begin the journey back towards a balanced budget.



This is a complicated way of saying that we have been through challenging times, but things are looking brighter ahead. It is said that tough times make you stronger, and I can feel the strength and commitment of this congregation in everything we do.

The Finance Committee will be watching our income, spending throughout the year, and reporting to the congregation at the February six-month financial review and prior to the next annual meeting. If you have any questions about our financials contact me or a member of the committee.
