

Transition Team

The Transition Team supports the work of our Interim Minister and paves the way for the Search Committee. We are now meeting about two times a month and will until June. Rev. Kaaren arrived in August and immediately, in collaboration with Twinks and about 60 volunteers, reimagined Fellowship Hall with tremendous creativity and energy. What a transformed and beautiful space for our CYM program!

Next Rev. Kaaren conducted a SWOT Analysis (**S**trengths, **W**eaknesses, **O**pportunities, and **T**hreats) to help her and us get a jump start on understanding our strengths and weaknesses. She then turned her attention to our financial deficit gathering church leaders and interested congregants asking them to think big with her and increase revenue in 3 areas including: increased Thrift Store hours, UU Vacation Homes, and the tree house project. These groups are all working and taking next steps. Much of Rev. Kaaren's work in these first 6 months has been in careful observation of boards, committees, teams and groups at First Parish Brewster to see how she can best serve us and help position us to be as strong as we possibly can as we head into search. She is working with the Board, Personnel, Membership, Social Justice, and Communications. The Transition Team is now reconstructing the history of First Parish Brewster to know where we've been so we can, along with the congregation, figure out where we are going.

Minister's Musing

When my kids were little we lived next door to my daughter Solveig's best friend. Solveig and Julia were thick as thieves, in and out of each other's houses daily, all through elementary, middle and high school.

Julia had a brother with Autism, and at times, her brother would come over to our house upset, often crying and yelling. If you were working at home, he'd want you to stop work, so he could rest his head in your lap. And with his head in your lap, he'd talk, we'd listen and eventually he'd calm down. Julia's mom, would call and ask "Is Steven over there?" "Yup, he is, no worries." After a while, once mellowed, we'd walk him back to his house. As he got older, he'd walk back on his own accord.

For Julia, she needed a break sometimes from this fabulous but complicated brother of hers, so our house became a respite of sorts. After a couple of years of being at our house almost every day, she'd open the big sliding glass door without knocking and say with great enthusiasm:

"My Peoples! Where are my Peoples!?!" And one of her "Peoples" would appear. Usually Solveig but sometimes one of my other kids or Scott and I.

She walked in like that at all times of the day for another ten years, yelling, "Hello, my Peoples, Where are my Peoples!" Every time.

I've always loved that. My Peoples.

Julia taught me to identify for myself when I've made that jump from –people I am in community with–to "My peoples!" After seven months with you, indeed you are "My peoples!" I'm grateful to so many of you for your graciousness and generosity of spirit that has made this so. I especially love how you do the same to new people walking in the door. You let them know, they are your peoples!

It's a particular gift that not all congregations hold. And yet you do. It's one of the many wonderful thing this congregation excels at.

Part of my work with you is to decipher and explore some of the fault lines that if dealt with, could help heal some past discord and offer a clearer path forward with a settled minister. There are some wonderful leaders on many committee's that are digging in to revise, revamp or redo policies and procedures, or behaviors and patterns that if addressed, will help this congregation exponentially.

There is much to celebrate here, and yes, some tweaks worth acting on. But every congregation has their growing edges. In the end, I'm confident you will attract and keep a minister that will love you fiercely, and remind you of your collective call.

We are about half way through the book and getting some good tips for transforming conflict. But the thing that inspires me the most is how honest the individual shares have been. We are learning about each other by listening to each other; we are letting others know ourselves by speaking up. Although it is okay for anyone to pass, it's always better when everyone shares their perspective. This process reminds me that we are more than the sum of our parts; truly better together.

Handpans are Handpanning

If you came to *Music Sunday* in April 2023, or to the summer *Open Music Gathering* that featured this instrument, then you might know what it is and what it looks and sounds like. Handpans are becoming more popular and springing up especially in meditative, yoga and spiritual communities because of their unique resonances, sonorities and overtones. Many people find the handpan to have a calming effect, and some use it as a part of their spiritual practice. Also called the hang drum, its origins are relatively recent. Over a period of years of research, a hangdrum builder (also called steel drum) and his partner experimented with turning the steel drum inside out and making it spherical, which resulted in the first handpan in the year 2000. A small group has started gathering at FPBUU and making music, learning how to play this alluring instrument together, which is very fun!

After some (but not too much) well-earned rest over the Summer, committees were re-energized and have been hard at work (not just meeting). Concerts, speaker programs, art installations, social justice actions – they are all happening. Work on our buildings and grounds, which never takes a rest, presses forward. Sunday Services are electrifying and religious education, in its amazingly refurbished quarters, is thriving. Fundraising and our other financial ministries are hard at work to secure a sound future for First Parish.

As I have previously said, perhaps our single greatest issue as we go

into the search for our next settled minister will be how to address the crises in availability and cost of housing on Cape Cod. To address that, during the Fall the Board of Trustees authorized the formation of a Minister Housing Taskforce. That taskforce has three working groups focusing on the following alternatives which we will be considering:

- 1) Converting either the Winslow House or Barn to housing
- 2) Acquiring off-site housing,
- 3) Creating a fund to assist a Minister in purchasing or leasing their own home

Members of each working group have been splitting up the tasks of determining the pros and cons of their group's respective approach to housing.

In addition, the Board authorized the formation of a Strategic Planning Committee, to focus on the congregation's major long-term goals, in coordination with the Minister Housing Taskforce which will be focusing on that one narrow goal. The intention is to develop a threeyear revolving plan, to be reviewed at the end of each year and then revised (based on results and changing goals and needs) and extended out for a new 3-year period. Initial work has begun, with the intention of doing much legwork over the next 16 months in order to be able to put together a formal plan in conjunction with the arrival of our next settled minister.

The work of both the Minister Housing Taskforce and the Strategic Planning Committee will, of course, be subject to approval by the congregation of the proposals formulated by the Taskforce and Committee.

Lifespan Religious Education Ministries



This June at our General Assembly we will vote on the proposed changes to Article 2 of the Unitarian Universalist Association's bylaws. This will be a major transformation, moving away from the 7(8) principles and replacing them with six values with love at the center. In short, our bylaws will reflect HOW we are Unitarian Universalists instead of WHY we are Unitarian Universalists, centering love in all we do.

This year in our grade-school CYM (Children and Youth Ministries), we have been celebrating the gifts that each of these values will bring to our church and putting them into action, through making and serving stone soup, making care packages for members who are homebound or in need of some love, and filling gratitude jars.

The proposed bylaw changes are asking us to grow and change, to transform how we practice UUism out loud. They are calling us to be the best we can be, to put our values into action, and at the heart of it all, to be there for each other, hold each other in community, and to love the heck out of the world. This moment has all the potential to be a pivotal moment in our history - if only we are brave enough to see it, if only we are brave enough to be it.

Membership Update

During the fall and winter, the Membership Committee focused with Rev. Kaaren on creating a more meaningful path to membership. Our new process starts with UU101, a short monthly post-service session where we meet visitors, listen to their stories/why they came and share the next steps to membership. Newcomers are also invited to take a three-class "Starting Point" course with Rev. Kaaren where participants explore Unitarian Universalism in a small group through the lens of our individual theological journeys; the journey/history of UU; and our journey together. Next, in a UU 201 session after a Sunday service, we go over

the privileges and responsibilities of membership, including details about pledging. Soon after, those who are ready, make a pledge of record and sign the Membership Book in the presence of the minister.

Since November, we have had two groups complete the Starting Point course to rave reviews from participants! On February 18 we held a UU201 session prior to a Membership Book signing on February 25. We will introduce all new members at a New Member Celebration on Sunday, May 19. A new member reception will be held during the summer.



If you are a newcomer and interested in learning more, UU101s will take place on Sundays, March 3 and April 14 after the service in the library. If you are interested in taking the next Starting Point course on Mondays, April 15, 22 and 29 from 4:00 to 6:00 in the Parish Room, please contact Paula Lieb. Childcare can be arranged for any parents interested in participating.

Summer's Not Over at FPB 2024

There was overwhelmingly positive feedback from kids, parents and FPB volunteers about last summer's SNO@UU program, as well as significant revenue generated for the congregation. So, with loads of excitement and momentum, we are embarking on the second year of programming during the "forgotten weeks" at the end of August. It is during this time that the need for childcare options is greatest. Last year, 56 volunteers made SNO@UU the success it was. This year, we aim to harness that same energy and creativity and ask that you join the fun! Financial Futures Tiger Team

About a year and a half ago, the executive team of the Board circled up to brainstorm ways our congregation could increase revenue at First Parish Brewster. Our consultant Barry Finkelstein had stressed to us that our beautiful campus, a terrific resource, was underutilized. Carol dubbed this emerging group the Tiger Team. Soon the Tiger Team split into smaller cohorts. One partnered with Twinks and CYM, developing **SNO@UU**, Summer's Not Over at UU, our two week summer program. Besides fulfilling a wonderful mission of providing desperately needed childcare in late August, offering

faith-based programming for kids, and involving about 60 volunteers, the net income was in excess of \$13,000 in 2023. We were able to offer generous scholarships and keep expenses low. Under Kris Yerby's leadership, an **Energy Group** formed and has done research into non -traditional revenue generating opportunities for churches. Eversource now has our application for the possibility of placing the latest generation of battery technology to provide efficiency and resiliency to the electric grid. There would be no upfront costs to the church and an estimated revenue to the church in the



range of \$20,000 per year. The **Grants Group** continues to explore grants from many sources. We have written and been awarded 6 grants so far in 2023 and 2024 for the Meetinghouse Speaker Series from town Cultural Councils and Cape Cod 5. Over the past 6 months, a **Rental Group** has been enhancing the property on both sides of the road and slowly new tenants have been signing leases. A group has been working on the rental pages on our website, concentrating on the wedding and events pages. **Meetinghouse Motors** was launched and we received our first truck donation.

Brewster Thrift Store is Gearing up for a Successful Spring and Summer

From the Endowment Board


The Endowment Board can distribute up to \$59,067 in the current fiscal year. To date we have contributed \$10,000 toward our UUA dues, funded many building projects including among others, the steeple restoration, Barn rot and Parish Hall ramp repairs, CYM's revitalization of Fellowship Hall, and pew changes. In addition, we have covered the Interim Minister's moving expenses and the CYM OWL retreat.

As of December 31, 2023, the value of the Endowment Fund was \$1,273,595. The Endowment Board may distribute up to 5% (\$63,680) for projects in FY 24-25 as allowed under the First Parish Brewster By-laws.

All this is possible because of the many gifts and bequests we have received over the years.

We drink from the well that was dug for us by our spiritual ancestors. Let us replenish the well for those who follow.

with a friend, on the two boards in the Parish Room for Food and Flowers, Flowers and Food!




Prayer Shawl Ministry

Disability Justice & Inclusion Committee

The Disability Justice & Inclusion Committee seeks to improve accessibility and inclusion for disabled folks in FPB worship, activities, and buildings. The DJIC is a new and emerging committee that seeks new members, including disabled people and non-disabled allies, and our meetings seek to meet the access needs of all involved. Our focus is to increase access and inclusion at FPB by identifying and publicizing our existing resources, determining our disabled congregants' unmet access needs and working to address them as budgets and creativity allow, and educating the congregation to reduce personal and structural ableism in FPB interactions. This fall and winter, after receiving feedback from many folks who were having trouble hearing aspects of our worship services,



we worked with Rev. Kaaren and staff to assess the existing hearing-assistance system in the Sanctuary, and took a field trip to "test drive" replacement hearing technology options in use at other religious communities. We are happy that a fix will be rolled out soon as part of a Sanctuary audio upgrade! Moving forward, we plan to survey the congregation about individual experiences with disability in the FPB environment, catalog our current access resources, and better disseminate those existing resources by highlighting them in our physical and electronic congregation spaces. We invite anyone interested in taking on discrete projects within that work, or participating intermittently as they are available. From the Treasurer

The Finance Committee has been busy in the past months improving communication regarding financial activities and preparing for the development of next year's budget.

A new Webpage called "Financial Information" is available on fpbuu.org which pulls together Financial Information of interest to the congregation. It includes things like the (a) charge to the Finance Committee, (b) the list of members of the Finance Committee (c) Financial Reports (d) Past pledging information and more. To find this page look under Governance.

The Mid-Year State of the Church and Financial Review was after church on February 18th. Our income this year is strong, and our expenses are as expected, so we are confident we will meet or do better than the budget this year. The key challenges as we continue to build our community are financial sustainability, minister and staff housing, maintaining our buildings and ensuring our staff are paid equitably. These are all significant challenges but with the enthusiasm and participation of many we see high hopes for our future.

We now begin building the Budget for the next fiscal year, July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2025. The first step of building a budget is the pledge campaign and collection of budget requests. Using the results of these initiatives and income and expense information gathered throughout the year, we start building the budget and understanding, in collaboration with the Board of Trustees, what it will take to have a balanced budget. Once the Board of Trustees approves the budget it is presented to the congregation at an informational session on June 2 and voted at the Annual Meeting on June 9.

Covenant Groups – A Program of Small Group Ministry

We are off and running in 2024, with seven groups led by 14 facilitators. Some of us meet in person, some are all-Zoom, and we also utilize a hybrid option for snowbirds and anybody else who cannot attend live. Many of us find that is so good to be together again in person after the pandemic. So far, the array of options for attending a monthly covenant group has worked very well.



Within a framework of monthly church-wide topics furnished by the "Soul Matters" curriculum, the use of suggested focus questions and spiritual exercises, and the practice of "deep listening," our group members have engaged in meaningful contemplation of worthwhile subjects. In our final 3 months of March, April and May, we will be diving into the following values of our liberal faith: "Transformation," "Interdependence," and "Pluralism."

Facilitators meet monthly and conduct a separate "mini-group" to preview the following month's topic and to engage in our own bonding. They have consistently reported that their group members have jumped in with both feet, "going deep" within the safety of our covenant based sessions. Each group has also engaged in providing hospitality for a Sunday service as part of our service commitment.

Julia Watts Belser (she/her) is a rabbi, scholar, spiritual teacher and a



longtime activist for disability and gender justice. She is Professor of Jewish Studies in the Department of Theology and Religious Studies at Georgetown University, as well as core faculty in Georgetown's Disability Studies Program and a Senior Research Fellow at the Berkley Center for Religion, Peace, and World Affairs. Her work brings ancient Jewish texts into dialogue with disability studies, feminist thought, queer theory, and environmental justice ethics. She is a cultural historian of rabbinic Jewish literature and a contemporary Jewish feminist theologian who draws disability arts and culture into provocative conversation with Jewish tradition to challenge structural violence, deepen our capacity for social justice, and honor the sacredness of disabled people's lives.

Belser has held faculty fellowships at Harvard Divinity School and the Katz Center for Advanced Jewish Studies at the University of Pennsylvania. She is the author of two scholarly books, *Rabbinic Tales of Destruction: Gender, Sex, and Disability in the Ruins of Jerusalem (Oxford University Press, 2018) and Power, Ethics, and Ecology: Rabbinic Responses to Drought and Disaster (Cambridge University Press, 2015). Her most recent book, Loving Our Own Bones: Disability Wisdom and the Spiritual Subversiveness of Knowing Ourselves Whole (Beacon Press, 2023; published in the UK by Hodder & Stoughton), is the recipient of a National Jewish Book Award.*

At Georgetown, Belser directs <u>Disability and Climate Change: A Public Archive Project</u>, an initiative that documents the wisdom and insights of disabled activists, artists, and first responders on the frontlines of climate crisis. She co-authored an international *Health Handbook for Women with Disabilities (Hesperian Foundation,* 2007), developed in collaboration with disability activists from 42 countries and translated into 14 languages, designed to help challenge the root causes of poverty, gender violence, and disability discrimination. She's also an avid wheelchair hiker, a lover of wild places, and a passionate supporter of disability dance.

FPBUU Policy Committee

The mission of the FPBUU Policy Committee is to develop policy language for issues deemed important by the Board of Trustees. Existing Policies may be found under the Governance heading on the FPBUU website. So far this year, the Policy Committee has revised the Animals on FPBUU Property Policy, is working on the creation of a Special Funds Policy, and has undertaken a major project in terms of developing a Records Retention Policy. Additionally, the Committee is currently in the process of developing language pertaining to certain aspects of the Annual Meeting process, the review of proposed bylaw revisions, and the use of the new flagpole. The Policy Committee meets monthly from September through May.
