



## **B. ENDOWMENT BOARD**

This year the Endowment Board voted to distribute \$24,352 for the following projects: Support for the Beloved Conversations program, a congregational retreat and special event advertising. \$20,000 was put toward the repayment of the Endowment Loan. The maximum distribution for the next fiscal year, based on 5% of principal is \$31,000.

All First Parish Brewster's Endowment Funds are managed by Cape Cod Five Trust and Asset Management in consultation with the Endowment Board. The most recent financial report dated April 30, 2020 showed an Endowment Fund balance of \$931,071.12. The Building Loan Repayment Fund balance was \$41,882.09 and the remaining balance due on the Building Loan was \$130,117.91.

This year gifts were received in memory of Dick Adami, Dave Akin, Janet Bell, Rob Gorman, Joanrose Kueng, Rob Moir, Dick Muñiz, Veronica Powers, Shirley Re, Rachel Stowe and Dana Wright. We received our annual gift from the Henry W. and Lucy B. Patterson Charitable Fund of the Cape Cod Foundation.

#### C. MINISTER

Last year in my annual report I ended with this statement: "I look forward to year three with all of you as we ponder the questions of 'What is the world asking of us? What is the Cape Cod community asking of us? What is the changing nature of church?"

Well here we are at the end of year three, and we have had to ask ourselves those questions over and over again. This community continues to rise to the challenge, and what a challenging year it has been. In the fall we as a community moved through how to name when trust has been broken by a previous staff member and made some painful decisions regarding that. This community over and over again has had to wrestle with questions around boundaries, trust, and covenant. The Board and Staff have tried to bring clarity to areas that might seem murky in order to provide clear expectations of staff and members. This is something we are continuing to work on. We are also working on clarifying authority with your elected leadership. We have made great strides in the areas of communication together as a congregation, and we still have room to grow.

Many of you (53!) participated in Beloved Conversations this past fall, I am so proud that so many said yes to this. Out of this we had much momentum towards UU the Vote, and this has not stopped due to the pandemic. Many of you are still writing postcards trying to get out the vote, and as we move towards November this will continue to be important.

When the pandemic hit in March, I thought we would be worshipping together in summer at the latest. Now current projections are looking at next year. I know this is heartbreaking for many. But this congregation is incredibly resilient, and we will make it through this together. It will be hard, and difficult decisions will continue to be made. Know that your Board and I continue to hold the physical health of each of you and the fiscal health of our congregation as our top priorities.

We know Zoom isn't for everyone, and yet what a blessing it is to see your faces on there each Sunday. We have risen to the occasion once again as we answer the question "What is the world and Cape Cod Community asking of us?" Right now, the world is asking us to stay at home, to care for ourselves and each other. The changing nature of church right now is that small groups matter, now more than ever, and so does helping as many people as possible to worship online. We will get through this together dear ones, take courage and know that I love you very much.

## E. ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE MINISTRIES

I find myself reflecting on how different life is from July 2019. What hasn't changed is the dedication and generosity of FPBUU's members and friends. This community continues to show up and live out its mission

whether in Zoom services and meetings, calling one another, writing postcards for UU the Vote or at Black Lives Matter rallies wearing their masks.

Over the last year FPBUU has used technology to raise money, to support membership and leadership development and most notably to gather together in worship and small groups. With much success, we added online pre-bidding for the Silent Auction for the first time at Potato Fest in the fall. We expanded our use of digital forms to collect and manage data for Membership and Leadership Development Committees. Volunteers stepped up to offer one on one tutorials allowing the majority of the congregation to attend services and meetings via Zoom.

Annually, I work closely with the Finance Committee and Rev. Jessica to create a proposed budget. This year we applied for and received a federal Paycheck Protection Program loan for \$72,300, all of which will be forgiven. Even though the pandemic created more uncertainty than we had experience in prior years, I was deeply heartened by the commitment of the congregational leadership and Rev. Jessica as they led with heart and vulnerability during this incredible time.

With sadness and much appreciation, we said goodbye to Linda Delorey as our long-time manager of the Thrift Store. She retired and moved to be close to family in New York but has continued to join us via zoom now as a member. Thank you to Deb Selkow and Donna Bray for serving on the hiring team with me and helping to find the best possible replacement. Celine Crook, our new manager, has jumped in with flexibility, determination and new ideas.

A wholehearted thank you to the COVE Team. We miss being together in the physical office. Know that we will continue to find creative ways to support this resilient congregation, like our Virtual Open Office Hour that has been held each Thursday over the last month. We don't know what this next year will bring, but we do know that we are in this together which is what community is all about.

Rog drafted an Emergency Preparation Plan to guide Staff and Building Maintenance Committee. Ben purchased and filled sandbags. Dave arranged with Eversource for installation of extra lighting on the driveway exit by real estate office and the crosswalk in front of Meeting House. It took 50+ volunteers to make this program (and pageants and community days) happen and we are grateful for them all.

## J. COMMITTEE ON SHARED MINISTRY

In our capacity as the COSM we allocated our energies between celebrating goals that were focused by our work the previous two years and addressing events that needed attending to. Early in the year we noted with pleasure the robust participation in the "Beloved Conversations" program at First Parish and were impressed by the commitment of the leaders and attendee's in doing this valuable work. As a group we also shared reading "Centering" a collection of essays written by UU ministers of color that were reflections on the challenges of multi-cultural leadership in our religious community. We also were pleased by the process of clearing up the tensions within the governance regarding management of personnel by thoughtful and constructive negotiations between the church leadership. This development should prove to be helpful given the circumstances that we find ourselves in currently in uncharted territory concerning operations and budgets. A challenge to the FPB congregation presented itself with the request of attendance by our former DRE. As feelings ran very deeply on every side of this issue, we needed to find a way for all voices to be heard and respect paid to all interested parties, as there was no clear policy to guide the decision making. These issues had become painful and uncomfortable for many. A process was presented which included participation by the CYM Committee, Reverend Jessica, Right Relations Team, COSM, The Board of Trustees, and the Safe Congregational Committee. Events of sensitive and deeply personal material only underscore the need for a congregational wide covenant and an e-mail policy to foster more clear and healthy communication between all members, staff and governing boards of the church. The final part of our year was the expedited Annual Review for Reverend Jessica with the goal to have her application in place for her full accreditation as a Minister in time for the General Assembly scheduled for Providence this June. We are very pleased that the dedicated work that Reverend Jessica has performed in good faith at First Parish Brewster has been rewarded with Full Fellowship and hope to find a way to fully celebrate our work together in the near future. ## K. COVENANT GROUPS: A Program of Small Group Ministry, A Year of Sharing & Fellowship

Covenant Groups, each led by two co-facilitators, met monthly for consultation and on-going training. We had five groups this past year. Through deep listening and sharing reflections on the themes from the UUA Soul Matters program, Covenant Group members build connection and bonding as we "open our hearts"

together. Participants grow our souls through examining personal and collective values as we embark on journeys which can be truly transformative, both individually and as part of a caring community.

Love turns into justice when we share our intimate stories and build better understanding of our diverse perspectives and differences. Loving justice can also be characterized by wholeness making and transforming relationships. Through the sharing process, we deepen our sense of connection, bonding and belonging. This year, Covenant Groups met the challenge of staying safe during the Covid-19 outbreak by holding virtual (Zoom) meetings during March – May, and most members learned the new technology in order to participate. Some groups will continue to meet online throughout the summer as the church buildings will be closed.

Putting our faith into action is an important component. Covenant groups complete a service project to help the FPBUU community, or the greater community beyond our walls. In past years our service projects included: Sunday morning hospitality, "Meals on Wheels" at Our Lady of the Cape Church on Christmas day, Shed Sale during Brewster in Bloom, hosting an all-church potluck dinner focusing on Covenant Groups, and the Dennis Habitat for Humanity build in Dennis. Unfortunately, the coronavirus outbreak curtailed our service projects this year, but significant financial donations were made by Covenant Group members to the Pleasant Bay Nursing Home and the Faith Family Kitchen to aid their efforts at helping patients and families during the pandemic.

This year, we celebrated our twelfth successive year of running covenant groups under the model, initiated by Rev. Judy Smith Valley, Linda Bailey-Davies and others.

## L. FILM AND DINNER SERIES

It is our pleasure to provide documentary films and discussions in the setting of a home cooked meal. Our group aspires to provide education on a broad range of issues, including racism, human rights, immigration, health threats, sexual abuse and environmental threats. The films are intended to provide a deeper understanding of the issues and in many cases provide a call to action. Discussions can be lively and revealing, informative and always fun.

Additionally, these evenings provide parishioners the opportunity to get to know other members of the church and to strengthen relationships and bonds. This is a natural consequence of providing a common interest in an intimate setting. Last year we were able to implement the recommendations for a more supportive alcohol policy and added vegan meal options.

Though our goal is not to raise money, this year's series raised approximately \$1,000 to support First Parish Brewster initiatives. This amount was reduced from previous years due to cancelled programs as a result of the Covid 19 pandemic.

Next year will be a challenge in the setting of our church closure due to the pandemic. Discussions have just begun, but copyright issues may be a formidable challenge, if the series were to have to be conducted online.

#### M. FINANCE COMMITTEE

Eight months into the year and the Finance Committee was feeling very very good, everything was right on track. With just the slightest of variances here and there, things were going according to plan. And then in mid-March the seriousness of the pandemic took hold. The campus closed down and it became a time of physical distancing. We shifted our financial focus to cutting costs, increasing income, and assessing how to move forward.

Karena Stroh, Administration and Finance Director, successfully applied for the PPP loan and brought \$73,200 additional revenue to the FPBUU, all of which will be forgiven. She was in uncharted territory but moved with a sense of purpose. Her skillful work meant we ended the year with a \$23,000 surplus instead of a \$50,000 deficit, and she deserves our deep gratitude. In addition to making it through the current year, we needed to navigate the uncertain future.

Setting a financial course for the coming times has been skillfully led by Rev. Jessica Clay with guidance from the UUA. She has shared resources to help us look out to the horizon to see how we need to set our sails for financial health in the coming year. Our professional staff led the creation of this year's budget. By taking the lead, staff was able to fluidly and efficiently collaborate with the Endowment Board, Stewardship Committee, and Finance Committee. The FPBUU Board voted to recommend the balanced budget for FY2021 (July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2021), and the congregation will vote on it at the Annual Meeting.

This pandemic will pass. The majority of the recovery may take many months or years; no one really knows. What we can know is that in the years to come, FPBUU will be thriving! Our members will love and care for each other! We will look back and feel proud of ourselves and the ways we acted now. This crisis reveals who we are: a people committed to love, truth, helping others, and one not willing to risk harming a few to make life more comfortable for the rest.

## S. ONE EARTH ONE PEOPLE/RACIAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE

When they faced crises, seeking support for the House and Senate bills for the Reaffirmation of Mashpee Wampanoag Reservation and after the Dept. of the Interior disestablished the Mashpee Wampanoag Reservation, we networked to send letters, emails and make phone calls to officials.

We worked with Barnstable, Bourne, Dennis, Truro, and Wellfleet to support the State Flag and Seal Bill. Some plans are currently on hold, but through emails, phone calls, texts and letters, we continue to work to open hearts, grow souls, turning love into justice.

#### V. RIGHT RELATIONS TEAM

The RRT did some restructuring in the past year to minimize 'committee meeting fatigue' that provides a core team and in addition, a group of members that join an 'All RRT' meeting less often than the core, and can be called upon to help with mediations and any other requests.

This year, too, Gisele Gauthier resigned from co-leading the RRT with April Naturale and Chuck Madansky stepped in to fill the rest of Gisele's time through June 2020. April Naturale's tenure also ends in June 2020, thus new leadership will be forthcoming.
